

Cost of Living in the Northern Territory

Sharp rise in Food Costs in corner stores in major centres since 2007

2017 report shows Healthy Food Basket¹ costs \$164 or 31% more in corner stores than NT supermarkets!



Many low-income households lack access to affordable transport and have limited choice but to shop at corner stores where prices are high².

NTCOSS is calling for:

- Addressing of gaps in regional centre public transport.
- Improving affordability of access to private vehicles by extending the Motor Vehicle Concessions (under the NT Concession Scheme) to all Centrelink Health Care Card Holders.
- Support for Food Bank Hub² establishment in other parts of the NT.



¹The Healthy Food Basket is based on foods recommended in the Australian Guide to Healthy Eating.

² A Food Bank involves the collection of surplus, salvaged and donated foods from producers, manufacturers and retailers, to make available to charities and community groups.



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Store Management and Ownership structure can influence price and quality

In stores that are owned by a store group (OSG), or managed by a store group (MSG) - e.g. Arnhem Land Progress Association (ALPA) and Outback Stores - a healthy food basket is generally cheaper (except for in the Darwin region) than the community run or privately run stores - and there is likely to be a greater variety and a better quality of fresh fruit and vegetables.

In 8 of the 45 stores surveyed across the Alice Springs and Katherine regions a healthy food basket cost \$1000 or more. These are predominately privately owned stores. These costs are at least 87% higher than in an NT supermarket - and as much as 125% higher.

NTCOSS is calling for:

Avg. MSG/OSG \$777

- Urgent action to reduce the spiralling price of healthy food in remote stores building on the Stronger Futures investment in infrastructure and licensing. Extending freight subsidies should be considered.
- Provision of capped subsidies for NT Concession Scheme Recipients to use remote private transport services to regional centres to periodically shop for bulk food items and groceries.
- An increase in the base rates of allowance payments, e.g. Newstart, by a minimum of \$75 per week and indexation of these payments to wage and price movements.
